Our innovation centres address societal challenges by bringing together the private sector, central and local governments and the creativity and problem-solving capabilities of our global experts.









Advanced Manufacturing Innovation Centre (AMIC)

AMIC is a £100m collaborative, innovative powerhouse of advanced manufacturing set to elevate our region globally.

The innovation centre is being delivered by Queen's in partnership with industry, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council, Ulster University, and supported

by the UK Government and NI Executive.

It will provide a specialised environment for advanced manufacturing, materials, and engineering sectors to access the latest digital, automation and robotics technology, supported by experienced engineers and underpinned by academic excellence. The innovation centre is on track to open a 10,500m2 state-ofthe-art Factory of the Future at Global Point Business Park in Newtownabbey in 2026.

iREACH Health

iREACH Health is a £62m integrated clinical research centre led by Queen's in partnership with Belfast Health and Social Care Trust and Health and Social Care Research and Development Division, Public Health Agency. It will

open in 2026/27 on two sites beside Belfast City Hospital.

It is crucial to Northern Ireland fulfilling its ambition to be a global leader in Life and Health Sciences in the next decade, by creating a patient-centred, pro-innovation, and digitally enabled person-centred clinical research environment.

The innovation centre will develop and test medicines, technologies, and therapies for better clinical care outcomes.

Momentum One Zero

Momentum One Zero is a £70m global innovation centre spearheaded by Queen's University, set to reshape Northern Ireland's digital landscape. By 2027, our state-of-the-art facilities will host over 550 collaborative experts dedicated to leveraging advanced digital technologies and secure connected intelligence.

Our focus extends across key sectors including Digital Health, Agri-food, and Cyber Security, with explorations into Semiconductor Security, Defence and Space, FinTech, and Net-Zero solutions. This initiative not only drives economic growth but also delivers substantial civic value, positioning Belfast as a leader in data-driven innovation for sustainable economic advancement.

Our expertise in conducting clinical trials and our world-leading facilities in cancer and precision medicine research are a testament to the breakthroughs that Oueen's research has facilitated over the decades. We are also leading the way in developing strategies and initiatives that mitigate against the worst effects of illness, and that act as preventative agents to illnesses developing in the first place. A strong public health approach, focusing on community well-being, aligned with a commitment to social justice drives our pledge to improve health outcomes which can reduce inequalities across society.

'The Recovery Package': Supportive Cancer Care for Patients and Families

We are transforming supportive care for cancer survivors and their families through the development of a new model for follow up care termed 'The Recovery Package'.

In 2010 our researchers carried out a study which found that cancer survivors, 2-15 years post-treatment, reported significantly poorer health than the general population in terms of physical functioning, emotional functioning, general health perception and social functioning.

To date, the initiative, which includes a holistic assessment. a treatment summary record. an individualised pathway and rapid entry back into the system, has improved the cancer recovery experience for over 10,000 patients.

The research resulted in the implementation of a new model of cancer patient follow up. termed 'The Recovery Package'.

Transforming the Lives of People with Cystic Fibrosis

We are improving the lives of thousands of people with Cystic Fibrosis by leading on the clinical development of treatments that address the underlving genetic deficit.

These transformative therapies improve lung health and have underpinned the regulatory approval and marketing of four breakthrough Cystic Fibrosis therapies.

The most recent trials successfully demonstrated that a combination of drugs can treat up to 90 per cent of people with

Cystic Fibrosis by addressing the underlying cause of their disease.

Destroving Cvanobacteria and their Toxins: An inreservoir treatment system

Cvanotoxins are toxic substances produced by bloom-forming cyanobacteria, a maior problem worldwide for water contamination. Cyclic hepatotoxins and microcystins, if consumed, are associated with liver cancer and can be fatal causing serious liver haemorrhaging.

Traditional water treatment methods are relatively ineffective at removing cvanobacterial toxins from water. However, the application of semiconductor photocatalysis is a novel and effective method for removing these compounds from water.

Our researchers have been taking this beyond the lab with an in-lake photocatalytic treatment process. A successful prototype system was successfully deployed in Brazil in October 2019, the unit capable of removing the cvanobacteria in-situ. Further refinement of the unit will see it deployed for in-situ water treatment applications.

The Economy

The economy of the next 100 years will be a necessarily different one to the economy we experience today. The ongoing climate crisis, our fossil fuel dependency, raw material shortages and the possibility of supply chain disruptions call for innovative, responsible and sustainable solutions.

For researchers at Queen's, the strategic priorities and expertise are clear. We will continue to focus our efforts on established and emerging areas such as intelligent manufacturing and service delivery, advanced and sustainable materials, solutions to future transport requirements, and understanding and harnessing high energy and ultra-fast processes. We also understand that successful and sustainable economies are about people as well as products – as central parts of society they must be underpinned by equality, equal access to opportunity, and social justice at all levels.

Towards Zero-emission Public Buses

The UK Government's "Road to Zero" strategy laid out an ambitious plan for all new cars and vans to be effectively zero emission by 2040, as well as schemes to encourage low emission public transport.

Our researchers, in collaboration with Northern Ireland bus building company Wrightbus, have developed best-in-class low and zero emissions technologies, playing a key role in decarbonizing UK and international public transport.

Building on over 20 years of work, our researchers have developed advanced hybrid powertrain modelling technology which is integral to thousands of low emission hybrid vehicles currently in service around the world.

Researchers

Researchers at Queen's are on a mission to make the changing global digital space both safer and faster. Our world-leading teams in cyberspace resilience and networks and connectivity are breaking new ground in the digital world, just as our teams in Geographical Information Science are doing in the physical.

Novel computer systems and changing computing paradigms require agile and cutting-edge research that can be translated quickly and effectively into real world practice. The use of data-fusing enabling technologies will drive socioeconomic development and improve the health, safety and security of future populations.

We work across disciplines to pursue digital breakthroughs that can act as a catalyst for new and creative cultural practices.

Secure Connected Intelligence

Our researchers design wireless communication systems that can withstand natural disasters and save lives.

Natural disasters kill an average of 60,000 people per year. Our researchers have designed and implemented a resilient and agile wireless communications system in Vietnam that provides seamless connectivity to relief authorities and workers when telecommunications infrastructures are significantly impaired.

The Integrated Heterogeneous Wireless System (IHWS) overcomes communication failures resulting from telecommunications networks damaged by natural disasters.

The solution offers a resilient and agile wireless communications design that can provide seamless connectivity even under critical conditions, such as destroyed telecommunication or electricity infrastructure.

The system also provides early warning of natural disasters by detecting water level, vibration and wind. In cities, the IWHS can detect increases in dust, temperature, noise, and carbon dioxide levels. 19 Queen's subjects in the top 200 in the world (QS World Rankings by subject 2024)

Edge Computing Hub: Making Edge Computing a Reality

The Edge Computing Hub is our growing and dynamic community of academic researchers and industry specialists working together to make 'edge computing' a reality.

Edge computing is a disruptive computing paradigm that allows processing data closer to users where it is generated, thus making internet applications more responsive, reliable and secure.

Our research tackles key system-centric challenges for deploying massively distributed edge systems by embedding intelligence into crucial decisionmaking activities. Current research addresses the challenges in distributed machine learning on edge computing systems and offloading services across a heterogeneous environment, as well as the standardisation of edge computing as an enabler for autonomous networking.

Global Insights

As a university based in Belfast, we are proud of our longstanding and world-leading track record in research relating to peace, identity, conflict and social sustainability.

Our lived experience of conflict as a society, its causes and consequences, drives our determination to deliver research excellence. Our research impacts the lives and livelihoods of communities across the world. We examine the different factors involved in building inclusive and cohesive societies. These include the role of governance. accountability, international relations, understanding the child's perspective, the need for creativity and cultural understanding. and valuing heritage.

Our local experiences have become alobal insights - we will continue to work with

colleagues and partners around the world to address the issues of fundamental rights, equality and social justice which lie at the heart of our mission.

Sharing Contested Heritage through Digital and Spatial Humanities

We partner with communities and institutions nationally and internationally to co-produce research that shares untold experiences of war. We enhance inclusive cross-community understanding of contested heritage. The Living Legacies 1914-18 WWI Engagement Centre has successfully created rich and extensive accounts of our shared heritage.

Our work aives new aroundina and provides new spaces for engagement around contested heritage through co-production projects, workshops, and events, working alongside communities to uncover new knowledge and deepen understanding of our shared past.

The six-year programme has achieved wide recognition by NI and UK policymakers as meaningful and significant for enhancing crosscommunity relations.



The Lundy Model: Meaningful Participation of Children and Young People

The Lundy Model of child participation, based on four key concepts (Space, Voice, Audience, and Influence), has been used and adopted by national and international organisations, agencies, and governments to inform their understanding of children's participation. The Lundy Model has generated a seachange in global understanding of child rights-based participation for both policy and practice.

The Lundy Model was developed by Queen's University Professor Laura Lundy. It transforms the ways in which the views and experiences of children across the world are heard by the United Nations (UN), European Commission and by public bodies across the world. It ensures that the UN, governments, national and international organisations involve children meaningfully in decisions that affect their lives.

Brexit and Northern Ireland: Explaining and Monitoring Unique Arrangements

The UK's withdrawal from the EU has been an extraordinarily complicated social, political and economic process. Nowhere is such complexity more evident than in Northern Ireland. Managing the fallout of Brexit on the region preoccupied the UK-EU negotiations and bedevilled their post-Brexit relationship.

UK and EU policymakers and negotiators relied on the work of researchers at Queen's to deepen their understanding of the challenges and inform their approach to addressing them. Subsequently, business and civil society actors have drawn on information and explanations provided by Oueen's researchers to adapt and respond to the new circumstances.

Environment

Understanding the relationship between humans and our environment has never been more important. The choices we face have never been so stark. Our climate is changing. The effects of this are being felt now as a day-to-day reality. There is an obligation on those involved in academic research to turn towards the challenges presented.

Whether this relates to our natural environment, creating safe and secure agri-food systems, assessing the way in which our built environment interacts with the natural world, or in the way we build and maintain truly liveable communities and societies, Queen's researchers are at the forefront of innovative, future-focused solutions that aim to make our footprint lighter, both on earth and beyond.





The 2008 Dioxin crisis, in which Irish pork was contaminated through feed, resulted in approximately 30,000 tonnes of pig meat product being recalled and destroyed. Over 170,000 pigs and 5,700 cattle from farms that received contaminated product were culled.

Queen's led an intensive 'Food Fortress' research programme to develop, validate and implement innovative techniques to detect and monitor a broad spectrum of feed-related contaminants. This programme provided a supply chain-wide quality assurance scheme.

The Food Fortress scheme is recognised internationally as a world-leading risk management and feed quality assurance scheme and is used as a major marketing tool by the UK and Republic Ireland food industries.

We have established global networks, working with more than 250 institutions and partners. Our research reputation is attracting major international investment.

For example, Queen's University Belfast has an integral role in a Northern Ireland nano technology consortium, which has been awarded £60m to develop new technology for medical devices, communication and data storage delivering new technologies as researchers work together with industry partners to develop new sensors for healthcare and optical communications.

INNOVATION AT ITS HEART

Belfast has a long and proud history of industry and innovation, from ship building to linen manufacturing. In the 18th century, Belfast had a strong pro-abolition and antislavery movement ahead of most UK cities. The Good Friday Agreement of 1998 pointed to Northern Ireland as a global role model for peace.

The tech sector is flourishing and there are around 15,000 tech-related job vacancies in Belfast (Tech Nation, Jobs and Skills Report 2022).

Northern Ireland is the most digitally connected region in the UK, according to BT. This plays a vital role in securing Belfast's status as one of the top 10 cities to develop a digital career (Monster's Digital Cities, 2019) and is ranked in the top 10 fastest growing tech cities in the UK (UK Digital Economy Council, 2021).

HOME TO THE WORLD'S BIGGEST COMPANIES

Belfast is a magnet for investment. As well as having a thriving start up scene, Belfast is increasingly home to large global companies. The number of businesses operating here that were established outside Northern Ireland has increased by a third since 2013. They now account for almost 25 per cent of the workforce. (NISRA - Inter Departmental Business Register 2023).

Young, high potential companies are booming and venture capital investment in Northern Ireland firms has tripled in three years (NI Deal Tracker 2023, Catalyst).

Belfast is the world's top destination for Financial Services technology investment and the number one international investment location for US cyber security firms (FT fDi Markets 2021).

The Titanic Quarter has become an economic and technological powerhouse, hosting global companies such as Citi, Microsoft, IBM and HBO. Catalyst, a science and technology hub, houses 200 companies which are spearheading tech innovation. It is home to our world-renowned Centre for Secure Information Technologies, which has helped create around 1,100 new cyber security jobs in Belfast.











A LOW COST OF LIVING

Relfast has the lowest student cost of living in the UK (Mercer Cost of Living City Ranking, 2023). In fact, it's over £300 per month cheaper for students to live in Belfast compared to London (Which? Student Budget Calculator, 2022), Students in Belfast spend least in the UK on household bills (Natwest Student Living Index 2024). A great value city it was found to have the lowest student rent in the UK (NatWest Student Living Index 2020) and it is £174 per month cheaper for student living costs in Northern Ireland compared to the UK average (Save the Student National Student Money Survey 2023).

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

WHEN TO APPLY

Applicants are advised to apply as early as possible for courses that start in late September. In the event that any programme receives a high number of applications, the university reserves the right to close the application portal. If this is the case, you will find a notification on the programme application page in the direct application portal. We recommend that you apply early as we may need to arrange for interviews or aptitude tests. If you are an international student, you should allow extra time to get a student entry visa.

If your first language is not English, evidence of an acceptable level of proficiency will be required. In addition. applicants who are non-UK/Irish nationals must satisfy the UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) immigration requirements for English language for visa purposes. This evidence should be in the form of a Secure English Language Test (SELT), normally the IELTS for UKVI Academic test, or another English language gualification acceptable to the University which examines all four elements of language learning - Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking,

Within this Prospectus, the English language requirement for entry to each postgraduate taught and research programme is expressed in terms of IELTS Academic test scores. The IELTS Academic scores listed are the minimum overall score requirements. For each individual test component, the minimum score required is normally 5.5, however for some programmes the component scores necessary may be higher. DAERA (formerly DARD) normally funds research courses relevant to the agricultural, horticultural, forestry, fishing or food processing industries. Applications should be made directly to DAERA.

To be eligible for a full DAERA postgraduate studentship award, you must have been resident in Northern Ireland for the full three-year period before the first day of the first academic year of the course. Republic of Ireland (Rol) nationals meeting the three vear NI residency are eligible for a full award under the Common Travel Area arrangement, EU, EEA or Swiss nationals meeting the three year residency must have settled or presettled status in the UK under the EU Settlement Scheme. Non-EU nationals meeting the three year residence must be settled in the UK by the closing date of the application. The main purpose of residence in NI must not have been to receive full-time education during any part of that three year period. TAUGHT MASTERS DEGREES


Master's degrees are designed to enable students to focus on a particular subject area or field of study in greater depth than they have encountered before in undergraduate study or employment experience. Students on our taught Master's programmes usually undertake a combination of taught modules. assessment and supervised independent research. Master's programmes usually involve two semesters of classes and assessed work followed by four or five months of research culminating in a dissertation or project.

Students undertaking a Master's degree have the opportunity to undergo a programme of training and development which aims to develop their leadership skills. Through the programme, students are able to undertake a 360-degree assessment of their skills and to participate in a range of training sessions and developmental activities, relevant to their needs.

Taught Master's degrees at Oueen's include:

Master of Arts (MA) Master of Architecture (MArch) Master of Business Administration (MBA) Master of Education (MFd) Master of Law (LLM) Master's in Law (MLaw) Master of Public Health (MPH) Master of Research (MRes) Master of Science (MSc)

For admission to a degree, a Second Class Honours degree from a UK or Republic of Ireland Higher Education Provider or an equivalent gualification acceptable to the University is normally required. Entrance requirements vary by programme and you should consult the individual programme entries in this auide or the online Course Finder qub.ac.uk/courses



POSTGRADUATE DIPLOMAS AND CERTIFICATES

Postgraduate Diploma courses usually last for nine months. with Postgraduate Certificate courses normally lasting four months. Where offered as a standalone gualification, they are typically structured in the same way as Master's degrees, without the research dissertation or project, and usually cover some of the same modules as the related Master's degree. The Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) is a vocational course which lasts for nine months and includes teaching placements.

The University offers postgraduate study for diplomas and certificates in a wide range of subjects. It may be possible for you to transfer registration from a Postgraduate Diploma to a Master's degree after completion of assessment at the required standard. All postgraduate taught students have the opportunity to undertake training in academic skills such as dissertation writing and referencing.



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POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH

As part of the Russell Group, Queen's is proud to be one of the UK's leading research universities, offering postgraduate research opportunities across all fields of study.

A research degree offers you the opportunity to gain in-depth, specialised knowledge in an original research project, guided by a supervisory team, which culminates in the presentation of a thesis which you defend in an oral examination.

During your studies you will also develop research, personal and professional development skills that will support future careers within academia, industry or the public sector.

PHD/MPHIL/MD/MCH

You will produce a traditional thesis, or, in the case of creative practice projects, your original creative works and an integrated critical analysis. For admission, an Upper Second Class Honours degree from a UK or Republic of Ireland Higher Education Provider or equivalent qualification acceptable to the university is normally required. Specific entrance criteria by programme are detailed in the online Course Finder **qub.ac.uk/courses**

You will be expected to submit your thesis at the end of three years of full-time registration for PhD, two years for MPhil/MD and one year for MCh (or part-time equivalent).

PHD BY PUBLISHED WORKS

This is awarded for the successful submission of a portfolio of research that was published prior to you registering on the programme, along with a critical analysis.

You must be an academic member of staff at Queen's, and have been so for a minimum of one year.

Registration is normally on a parttime basis, under the direction of an adviser appointed by the university. You will be expected to submit your published works, with a 10,000-word critical analysis, within one year.

PROFESSIONAL DOCTORATES

These are specialist qualifications available in the area of psychology which combine taught postgraduate modules with independent research projects located within a profession or practice placement.

HIGHER DOCTORATES

These are awarded to individuals who have an authoritative standing in their field of study, and seminal publications which have led to extensions or the development of knowledge by others. In order to apply for this programme, you must have a significant link to the university, normally by being a graduate or a current academic member of staff. You will usually have a minimum of 10 years' research experience at a postdoctoral level.

SKILLS TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

The development of transferable skills is an integral part of the experience of being a postgraduate research student.

The Postgraduate Development Programme led by the Thomas J. Moran Graduate School offers you a choice of training courses and development activities aimed at providing you with the skills to complete your higher degree and enhance your employability. The funding bodies for postgraduates consider the development of these skills as an essential part of training for careers both in academic and non-academic work environments.

The courses offered in the Postgraduate Development Programme supplement those provided by schools and are available to all research students.

Funding is available for studentled initiatives. These are activities developed and delivered by

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postgraduate students for postgraduate students. These initiatives can involve organising a conference, research seminar or some other research event.

You may be permitted to carry out some of your research away from Queen's. You will need to prove to the university that you will maintain appropriate contact with your supervisor and you will have access to the appropriate facilities during your time spent away. You may be required to spend a specified period of time in residence at the university.

You will be subject to the university's normal training and monitoring requirements.



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
